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Introduction

During the next 15 years we will all experience significant change as the Borough adjusts to growth through new housing and employment development and the supporting infrastructure. In the Borough this will include the regeneration of Redhill and Horley town centres, Preston, Merstham and the development of two new neighbourhoods in Horley. These exciting projects will deliver real improvements for everyone.

A Profile of Reigate & Banstead



Our Location

The combination of our rich and diverse landscape, unique character, and accessible transport network make this a popular area.

The Borough is located between London and the South Coast and contains a large Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. It has a number of commons and lowland heath including Sites of Special Scientific Interest.

Our location has brought challenges and opportunities for the Borough. Our close transport links to the M25, M23 and Gatwick Airport along with travel to work patterns have led to increased traffic congestion. Our proximity to Gatwick Airport has also raised air quality issues.

Our location has contributed to the creation of a strong and thriving economy coupled with strong pressure for development.

his section highlights the issues, opportunities and challenges in the Borough that have informed the Vision and priorities for the Borough. It provides us with the starting point for delivering your Community Plan and will help us to measure our success.

Our Population

We have a strong and thriving population. The Borough has around 127,200 residents, more than other East Surrey authorities, forming just over 54,000 households. At the time of the 2001 Census, the overall percentage of people identifying themselves as white British was 95% and the single largest ethnic group in the Borough identified themselves as Asian or Asian British and represent 2.1% of our population.

Our population will continue to grow steadily and at the same time will become more diverse. Households are becoming smaller. Just over 29% of households contain only one person. This trend towards smaller households is linked to changes in household structures and to the fact we enjoy longer than average life expectancy. The Borough age structure is similar to the national picture although we have a slightly higher number of children aged under 10 years and people aged over 80 years. Overall, our older population is predicted to increase by up to 40% by 2026.

Opportunities for Growth

We are progressing a number of opportunities across the Borough to realise our aspirations and ability to ensure the Borough remains competitive and productive over time.

We will explore new ways of working with partners and agencies to deliver New Growth Point and Regeneration projects. These projects will lead to improvements to transport networks, with better accessibility and decongestion to some roads of strategic importance. The future role of our Town Centres will offer modern infrastructure supporting business. We will explore new ways of increasing energy and water efficiency. This will help us to meet the supply and demand for energy in the Borough, ensuring we have a sustainable energy supply readily available for use.

In Horley, the development of two new neighbourhoods will bring significant change, whilst the regeneration of the Town Centre will improve facilities, accessibility and increase vibrancy. The regeneration of Redhill Town Centre and development of housing to the north of this area will transform the area. In Preston and Merstham, the regeneration of old facilities, housing and the landscape will provide new opportunities for community development.

Our Health & Wellbeing

Most of us enjoy healthy lives. On average the Borough has lower than average levels of early deaths caused by heart disease, strokes and cancer and has lower than average illnesses related to smoking, alcohol, and drugs.

However, the problems of ill health and mental health are not evenly distributed and some of our households do experience poorer health outcomes. These are related to a number of factors including age, deprivation levels, education, lifestyle and access to health services and facilities.

Healthier life styles and advances in medical practice have led to increased life expectancy, but increasing age is linked to a greater likelihood of developing dementia, physical or sensory disability.

Our Economy

Reigate & Banstead is an affluent area with high employment and a buoyant economy. Our location within the Gatwick Diamond influences our economy. The majority of occupations are based in the managerial, professional and technical fields. Our main industry is service, particularly retail, distribution, hotels and restaurants, businesses such as finance and IT and public services such as education, administration and health.

Over 79% of men and 65% of women aged 17 to 74 are economically active. Most people travel to work by car. More people commute out of the Borough for work than commute into the Borough and around a third of the working population live and work in the Borough. Our local economy needs to able to support population growth.

The percentage of people with no qualifications (20%) is significantly lower than the national average figure (29%) and the percentage of well-qualified people (56%) is significantly higher than the national average (47%). Borough residents achieve a high level of academic attainment, but there are concerns in the business community about levels of vocational and work based skills amongst school leavers.



Our Communities

Our communities have high expectations of services and of their quality of life now and in the future. The Borough is a relatively affluent area with low crime rates and very low levels of unemployment. Neighbourhoods in the Borough vary in size and character, from more densely populated towns through to small villages in semi rural locations. As a consequence distances from local services varies and has led to more reliance on the

The general economic prosperity in the Borough masks local variations. A number of our residents live in some of the most deprived areas in Surrey. We know that some of these people are not realising their potential and this impacts on community as a whole. By improving the life chances of those residents we can improve the quality of life of the community as a whole.

Your Environment



Climate Change

Our natural environment is at risk from climate change and we all need to take action to reduce this change.

At the wider level we need to make changes to the design and construction of new buildings, how and where we generate energy, and how we travel around the Borough. But making a difference is not simply about changing the big things. We can all make small changes in our lives that will make a big difference such as reducing and recycling our waste. We all need to "think globally and act locally".

All this can be done whilst looking after what we have got. Locally distinctive building materials and existing and new wildlife habitats can be combined with advances in new technology to enable a truly distinctive and sustainable legacy for future generations.

Four Environment is about maintaining a sustainable environment for future generations. Reigate & Banstead enjoys an attractive natural environment and unique local heritage. It is surrounded by countryside and has a varied landscape that takes in the Surrey Hills Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and many heaths, parks and green spaces. It also contains valuable wildlife habitats that are locally, nationally and internationally important. The Borough is a busy place offering a high and rewarding quality of life. However these aspects of Borough life are at risk from the growing pressure to develop, increasing levels of traffic congestion, pollution, and a growing population. All these issues together must be managed and balanced to exploit the positive impacts and to reduce the negative, protecting our Borough and the quality of life enjoyed by all.

Our Priorities

Green Spaces Are Your Places – encouraging us all to use, enjoy and protect the Borough's countryside, open spaces and parks

- Improve access to the local countryside and green spaces so that everyone has the opportunity to use these places for leisure, learning, and enjoyment.
- Encourage involvement in environmental education and conservation projects.
- Increase pride and interest in our unique local heritage and places of interest.
- Design wildlife habitats into new developments so that the natural environment is more diverse than today.
- Continue to protect the very best examples of landscape character and built heritage so that the Borough maintains its unique identity.
- Combine locally distinctive building materials with advances in new technology to enable a truly distinctive and sustainable local environment for future generations.

Waste not Want Not - Everyone is recycling and managing waste to reduce the need for landfill sites and improve our Borough

- Encourage everyone to reduce the amount of waste they produce.
- Increase the re-use of materials where possible.
- Create a positive, proactive and practical approach to recycling in our Borough.

Neighbourhoods for the Future



New Development

New development will take place in the Borough over the coming years and we recognise that improvements are needed to transport networks, water and energy supplies to accommodate it.

We will deliver these improvements through a range of measures including our New Growth Points projects. These projects will include a range of measures to support the development of sustainable communities. The delivery of housing in the Borough is reliant upon the appropriate levels of investment in social and physical infrastructure if the aim of creating sustainable communities is to be achieved.

This means linking housing and employment needs and directing development to locations already supported by transport provision, leisure, community and other essential services.

To mitigate the adverse carbon impacts of housing growth and to minimise the overall carbon footprint, it is essential that new housing be developed as exemplars of low carbon and sustainable development.

Teighbourhoods for the Future are well-designed places that meet the needs of local people and stand the test of time. This is a relatively affluent area with a strong local economy, high level of employment and a busy transport network. However, our success does come at a price. House prices are high, our roads are congested and some of our towns and neighbourhoods could meet the needs of our residents better.

Our Borough neighbourhoods are the towns, villages and places in which our communities live, work, go to school and enjoy leisure time. Neighbourhoods are places where people feel a sense of belonging and where what happens has an impact on everyday life. Creating neighbourhoods for the future is about not standing still, but working in partnership to identify the needs of the local communities.

Over the coming years the priority regeneration areas will be Horley, Preston, Merstham and Redhill and there will also be scope for work in other areas of the Borough. Understanding the changing needs of neighbourhoods and their interaction with services and facilities will help us to plan ahead and identify where improvements may need to be made in the future.

Our Priorities

Realising our Potential – improving Redhill, Horley, Preston and Merstham to meet the current and future needs of local people

- Revitalise Redhill Town Centre through the development of key sites and improved transport links, which encompass new public spaces, and integrated housing, leisure and shopping facilities.
- Regenerate Horley Town Centre through high quality residential, commercial and community developments to secure its future viability and vitality.
- Work in partnership and engage local people to change the social and physical environment of Preston to improve their quality of life.
- Join up public and voluntary sector services in Merstham through the creation of new community facilities that improve local opportunities.
- Maximise opportunities arising from the New Growth Points projects to make improvements to transport networks, energy supplies, and water efficiency to support regeneration priority areas.

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Home Time – working to develop homes to suit the changing needs of the borough population

- Ensure that neighbourhoods are sustainable for the future by promoting the right mix of homes in locations that have access to transport routes, local services and facilities.
- Work in partnership to increase the number and range of affordable housing
 options available to key workers, people on low and moderate incomes, and
 young people so that our residents have the opportunity of an affordable home
 of their own.
- Improve and maintain the condition of homes in the Borough to give everyone the opportunity to have a decent and safe home.
- Improve the ability of vulnerable people to live independently and safely at home.

At the Heart of the Community - ensuring that services and facilities respond to the needs of the local neighbourhood

 Increase the number of shared community facilities such as health care and libraries so they are easy to access.


