

# Development Management Plan (Regulation 19) Reigate & Banstead Open Space, Sport & Recreation Assessment Appendix 8: Fields in Trust Amenity Standards

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## 1. Introduction

1.1 This appendix provides an overview of the Fields in Trust recommended standards.

#### Accessibility

1.2 Accessibility guidelines are provided as walking distance from dwellings.

Distance (m)	Recommended Walking (Minutes)
250	2-3
400	5
800	10
1,200	15
1,600	20

- 1.3 When applying these benchmarks, local features and obstacles to pedestrian and cycle movement should be taken into account.
- 1.4 Accessibility thresholds should be measured as distances actually walked rather than 'as the crow flies'.

#### **Children & Young People**

- 1.5 Fields in Trust recommend the use of durable equipment to reduce the burden and cost of maintaining open spaces. They recommend that management and maintenance regimes should be put in place to ensure repair and replacement can be facilitated over time as necessary to maintain the standard of quality.
- 1.6 The table below details the Fields in Trust recommended benchmark guidelines for formal outdoor space.

1.7 It advises that local authorities can set their own quality benchmark standards for playing pitches, taking into account the level of play, topography, necessary safety margins and optimal orientation

- 1.8 Local authorities can set their own quality benchmark standards for play areas using the Children's Play Council's Quality Assessment Tool<sup>1</sup>.
- 1.9 The table below details the recommended application of quantity benchmark guidelines for equipped and designated play space.
