London Gatwick is consulting on its Airspace Change Proposal for the future operation of Route 4 - one of the departure routes for aircraft flying out of the Airport.

The airport is committed to working with local communities and over the years has involved them in the development of the route options and Design Principles associated with this public consultation.

London Gatwick is seeking feedback from the public and stakeholders on the shortlisted route options and their potential impacts and benefits.

The consultation will run from Tuesday 20 January 2026 to 23:59 on Tuesday 28 April 2026. There are a range of ways to take part in the consultation.

Dear residents,

You may recall that in October 2025, the Government confirmed that district and borough councils in Surrey, along with Surrey County Council, will be abolished and replaced by two new unity authorities - East Surrey Council and West Surrey Council.

From 1 April 2027, Reigate & Banstead will become part of East Surrey Council – which will have responsibility for the full range of local government services in the area, including social care, children’s services, waste and recycling, local planning and roads.

Importantly, we will continue to provide our services as normal until then. As planning for the new council takes place, we are committed to working together with everyone involved to ensure residents’ voices are heard and local priorities are reflected.

In this magazine, you can read more about the reorganisation and what it means for residents, as well as the important milestone of electing new councillors in May (pages 8-9).

Town and parish councils

In summer 2025, we started a community governance review to ask what local people thought about the existing arrangements for parish and town councils across the borough. This was followed in November 2025 by a second consultation, asking for views on specific recommendations which could see every household in the borough represented by a parish or town council.

Strong local representation is important as we move from having district and borough councils to a larger East Surrey Council (see page 8).

Thank you to everyone who provided their views – which informed the final recommendations that will be reviewed for a decision by the Full Council on 26 March 2026. Any changes are expected to come into effect on the same day as the next scheduled parish and town council elections in May 2027.

Local Plan progress

We continue to develop the evidence base for our emerging new Local Plan, with studies into housing and economic land availability, retail and leisure needs, strategic flood risk and environmental sustainability.

The Local Plan sets out where new homes, commercial space and facilities will go in the future, as well as the infrastructure needed to enable this. It also guides what development will look like and the measures to protect the environment and character of the area.

At the time of writing, we await confirmation of the Government’s changes to local plan regulations which affect how far our plan can be progressed. We also now need to consider Local Government Reorganisation and the emerging East Surrey unitary authority.

We will involve local communities in the plan making process when the time comes. In the meantime, you can find out more and to register for updates at reigate-banstead.gov.uk/emerging-planning-policy



New town park for Horley

Horley residents are set to benefit from an exciting new town park at Tanyard Meadows.

The £3.9 million project in northeast Horley will significantly expand and improve outdoor play, fitness and grassroots sports space for the town’s growing population.



The range of facilities could include a new sports pavilion with toilets and changing rooms, play equipment for various ages and abilities, sports pitches, an outdoor gym or trim trail, multi-use games area, ball court and youth facilities, as well as walking and cycling routes. There are also plans to enhance the sensitive Burstow Stream environment, balancing recreation with nature conservation.

A design team will join the project to work with local people, clubs and organisations to ensure that the final scheme meets community needs. The new park is expected to be completed in 2028.

The project will be funded by developer contributions earmarked through a legal agreement with the developers of The Acres and Westvale Park to deliver new local facilities.

Harlequin update

A £4.5 million project to bring the Harlequin Theatre back to life at its previous 494-seat capacity is progressing.

We have appointed experienced specialists, Bailey Partnership, to plan, design and project manage the removal of Reinforced Autoclaved Aerated Concrete (RAAC) from the building and carry out essential improvements needed to safely reopen the venue. We are in the process of appointing a contractor to carry out the works.

In parallel, we have tendered for an experienced third-party operator to run both the Harlequin and Unit 5 (the new arts and cultural venue in The Rise), whilst ensuring that future programming will continue to serve the community through professional and amateur productions for years to come. We hope to announce both the new operator and contractor soon.

Plans on track to modernise Horley Community Centre

Our plans for the refurbishment of Horley Community Centre are now well progressed. Built more than 40 years ago, the centre requires significant modernisation to meet the needs and aspirations of the local community. Improvement works will also reduce maintenance costs and make the building more energy efficient.

The Council approved a budget of £2 million last July and, since then, local people have helped to develop the architect's designs through a local advisory group and public engagement. The building is expected to close for nine to twelve months this summer and we are finalising details for a temporary activity programme whilst the works are taking place.

Community asset scheme sparks huge interest



Our community asset transfer and support programme – which will ensure vital facilities such as community halls, sports pavilions and open spaces continue to meet the needs of local people beyond the life of the Council – sparked huge interest.



We received over 160 expressions of interest from 84 local organisations keen to take on the management of council-owned assets. Almost 30 organisations that operate their own buildings bid for grants to improve them. A package of support is available for small community groups.



Assets that deliver key council services, produce significant income, or are needed for strategic reasons were not up for transfer.

Following thorough assessment, 52 schemes have been invited to submit full business cases to show they can manage the assets in a financially sustainable way and in the best interest of local residents. Final decisions will be made later this month (March), when the transfer process can begin for successful bidders.

Celebrating creativity and the arts in the borough

Our Leisure team promotes art and creativity, as well as sport and physical activity, in the borough.

Art and culture can boost wellbeing, bring people together, and create a buzz about the borough that residents and visitors can enjoy. Through projects like REECH (which stands for relax, engage, experience, create, hydrate emotionally) in Banstead and Tadworth, or creating public art in Westvale Park, Horley, we work with local artists and businesses, to encourage communities to get creative.



Arts Takeover

Launched in 2023, Arts Takeover is a week-long festival of the arts that provides free or low-cost performances and creative workshops in Redhill. Last autumn, 26 artists and 10 venues helped to make the third Arts Takeover bigger and better than ever.

On the opening Saturday, Hive Studios produced our first-ever live music stage at The Junction pub and restaurant, showcasing free performances from six talented local acts.

We also introduced Redhill's first Recycled Fashion Show where 15 amateur stylists turned junk into funk and strutted their stuff on the stage at The Belfry shopping centre.

Working with the Lucy Rayner Foundation, we curated a community art exhibition, displaying 178 portraits from young artists under the theme 'This Is Me'.

From choirs to comedy and line dancing to horror writing, we offered more than 30 individual events and 318 people signed up for workshops. Thank you to everyone who took part.

School holiday activities

Our low-cost school holiday programme continues to grow its creative offer alongside sport and outdoor activities. Highlights have included a film school, JamCoding, craft, dance, and the ever-popular Show in a Day.

Activities are inclusive and there is a 50 per cent discount for looked after children and those in receipt of benefits.

Investing in thriving communities

Launched in April 2025, our Thriving Communities Fund is contributing £104,000 to projects that empower local people and support the creation of strong communities.

We catch up with some of the 27 organisations that have secured match funding and are delivering a variety of projects benefitting people of all ages, faiths and abilities.



Communications classes

Research shows that people living with sight and or hearing impairment are disproportionately impacted by loneliness and social isolation, and are twice as likely to be digitally excluded compared to the general population.

Sight for Surrey's weekly communications class held at Merstham Village Hall is a free, informal meet-up providing practical advice and support, plus activities such as mosaic making, music and quizzes.

Local Government Reorganisation: What you need to know

As reorganisation plans take shape following the Government's decision to replace all existing Surrey councils with two new councils, here's what you need to know.

In October 2025, the Government confirmed that district and borough councils in Surrey, along with Surrey County Council, will be abolished. They will be replaced by two new unitary councils - East Surrey Council and West Surrey Council - to deliver all local government services in their respective areas.

The geographic area of Reigate & Banstead as well as Elmbridge, Epsom & Ewell, Mole Valley and Tandridge councils will become East Surrey Council, while the geographic areas of Guildford, Runnymede, Spelthorne, Surrey Heath, Waverley and Woking councils will form West Surrey Council.

From 1 April 2027, East Surrey Council will be responsible for the full range of local government services you rely on, including social care, children's services, education, roads, waste and recycling, planning, housing, leisure provision and more.

This, it is hoped, will make the system simpler, build financial stability, deliver savings, and unlock economic growth.



At Reigate & Banstead, we know that residents value the services we provide. As planning for the new council takes place, we are committed to working together with everyone involved to ensure that residents' voices are heard and local priorities are reflected.

Importantly, up until East Surrey Council comes into operation in April 2027, we will continue to provide services to our residents and businesses as usual. Residents will be provided with more details about the new East Surrey Council in good time before this date.

Your new East Surrey Council councillors

On 7 May 2026, you will have the opportunity to vote for who you want to represent you on East Surrey Council. Elected councillors will have an important role in determining how the new council will run its services and make decisions, including agreeing its priorities, budgets and senior staff.

East Surrey Council will have 72 councillors - two for each of its 36 wards. Initially, they will serve for a five-year term. Thereafter, elections to the new council will revert to the usual four-year term.

Electoral ward boundaries will be based on the recently updated county division boundaries, which means that there will be 20 councillors representing 10 wards in the geographic area of Reigate & Banstead.

This is the biggest change to local government in 50 years, so we strongly encourage all eligible voters to take part in these elections.

Your existing county and borough councillors will represent you until 31 March 2027 while these councils continue to deliver your services. There will be no county or borough elections in May 2026, unless a by-election is required.



Get ready to vote in the East Surrey Council elections

You must be registered to be able to vote. If you're not already registered, you have until midnight on 20 April to do so at [gov.uk/register-to-vote](https://www.gov.uk/register-to-vote)

You can vote in person, by post or by proxy. To vote in person, you must bring an accepted form of photo ID. These include a passport, a driving licence and some concessionary travel passes, such as an older person's bus pass.

To find out what types of photo ID are accepted and to apply for a free Voter Authority Certificate (VAC) if you don't have suitable ID, visit: [gov.uk/apply-for-photo-id-voter-authority-certificate](https://www.gov.uk/apply-for-photo-id-voter-authority-certificate). The deadline to apply is 5pm on 28 April.

If you will be unable to get to a polling station on election day, apply for a postal vote as soon as possible, and no later than 5pm on 21 April. For a proxy vote - when a friend or relative you trust casts your vote for you - you must apply by 5pm on 28 April. Apply online at [gov.uk/how-to-vote](https://www.gov.uk/how-to-vote)

Timeline*



7 May 2026:

Elections held for the new East Surrey and West Surrey councillors.



May 2026 to March 2027:

East Surrey Council operates as a 'shadow authority' to prepare to take on all local government services smoothly, while residents continue to receive existing services as normal.



1 April 2027:

East Surrey Council takes over responsibility for delivering services from other Surrey councils, including Reigate & Banstead and Surrey County Council. Surrey's existing 12 councils formally dissolve.



After April 2027:

The Government has indicated that once the new councils are established, work can progress to set up a new Strategic Authority, that could bring more powers and funding into the county. This would cover the whole of Surrey and have a directly elected Mayor.

Your Council Tax explained

In an effort to minimise costs for our residents, we are freezing our share of your Council Tax this year, delivering all of our services for just £5 a week per household.*

In this, our last budget as we prepare to become part of East Surrey Council in April 2027 (see pages 8-9 for more), we will continue to deliver the same high-quality services efficiently and effectively, balancing financial pressures and service demands with our commitment to support residents and the borough. We hope our track record of good financial management will put us on a strong footing for the new East Surrey Council to build upon.


Council Tax bill breakdown

We retain just **10p** in every pound of the Council Tax we collect to help fund the more than 50 services we provide to our 159,000 residents. A typical band D household* will pay **£264.87** this year.



The remainder goes to Surrey County Council - including Surrey Fire and Rescue Service (76p) and Surrey Police (14p).

Meeting the housing challenge

We are working with our partners to provide homes that are more affordable, and to support those in housing need.

Funding to support housing providers

House building has slowed nationally, which has had an impact on the delivery of affordable homes. This, combined with an increase in households needing housing support, has increased the waiting times for people on the housing register.

To help combat the issue locally, we have allocated £3.5 million to support housing associations deliver new homes for social rent and affordable rent.

We have assisted local providers to deliver similar schemes previously. This includes contributing £1.2 million towards supported housing delivered by Transform Housing & Support and East Surrey YMCA, along with 23 homes by Raven Housing Trust for social rent to people on the housing register. Working together has also helped with resolving viability issues and securing additional grants and funding.

Let NextStep find your next rental tenant

If you're a landlord looking for tenants for your rented property, the YMCA's free NextStep service can help. We work with NextStep to match landlords with households in need of housing.

Benefits for landlords using the scheme include:

- it's free with no hidden fees
- ready and available tenants, so no need to advertise
- NextStep do all the paperwork to start and maintain a tenancy (except gas safety and EPC certificates)
- applicants are assessed and references provided
- financial security through a guarantee bond while NextStep work with tenants to save a deposit
- advice on landlord and tenancy matters.

Your guide to Simpler Recycling

Our waste collection team has been making sure all household bin collections will comply with the Government's new Simpler Recycling requirements.

What is Simpler Recycling?

Simpler Recycling aims to increase recycling by making it easier and reducing confusion. By 31 March 2026 everyone will be able to recycle the same materials wherever they live in England.

All households should have containers for kerbside collections of:

- food waste - which must be collected at least weekly
- paper and card
- other mixed dry recyclable materials (plastic, metal and glass)
- non-recyclable waste.

What does this mean for Reigate & Banstead?

Since 2012, our recycling household collection service has fit the Simpler Recycling model. However, some properties, particularly flats, had been difficult to access, due to vehicle restrictions or limited bin storage.

In preparation for the new legislation coming into force, our Recycling and Waste team has been working hard to roll out the full service to remaining properties.

The popular garden waste service remains and is available to all residents as a paid for service on request. From April 2026, the cost for collecting garden waste will be £79 per bin per year.

Recycle more

As a borough, we currently recycle 54% of the waste collected but we know that much more can be recycled.

Sorting and recycling your household waste makes a big difference by reducing rubbish and pollution, protecting the earth's natural resources and saving energy.

From April 2026, there will be some new items that you will be able to put in your mixed recycling bin:

- ✓ squeezy metal tubes, such as tomato puree
- ✓ squeezy plastic tubes, such as toothpaste or cosmetics
- ✓ plastic non-black plant pots

If you're unsure which bin to put any item in, you can easily check online using the Surrey Recycles search tool:

Protecting public safety

Our Environmental Health and Licensing teams have had a bumper year, sending a clear message that the Council is committed to ensuring public safety.

From delivering food hygiene inspections and addressing private sector housing complaints, to regulating taxis, licensing premises, monitoring air quality and successfully prosecuting wrongdoers, our teams have been busy. This work has helped to keep our residents safe and well at home, when out and about, and at work.

Langshott Manor fined for food hygiene breaches

In August 2025, we successfully prosecuted Utopia Leisure Ltd, the company who run Langshott Manor Hotel in Horley for serious breaches of food hygiene legislation.


Our Environmental Health team found that the hotel's food handlers had not been sufficiently trained in systems and procedures relating to food hygiene and allergens. The standard of cleanliness in the food preparation areas was poor, high-risk food ingredients were being kept past their labelled use by dates, food ingredients were kept in conditions which made contamination likely, and a designated raw meat surface was being used to prepare and store ready to eat and cooked foods.

Sentencing, the judge noted that there had been a failure from the defendant "to take appropriate action" and that "this failure was a long standing one". The Court ordered them to pay a fine of £80,000 plus £21,000 in costs.

We want to provide help and support to local businesses and our officers try and engage by offering advice and guidance where possible. However, when businesses fail to comply with legal requirements, we will take appropriate enforcement action as we did in this particular case.
