### The power of place-based partnerships

Safer Redhill has brought together a number of national and local streams of work under a **single partnership banner**. The single banner has created a coherent approach and a clear and common message for residents about the wide-ranging work.



The project has been a **partnership** endeavour

- **10 partners** attending regular delivery group meetings
- On average **30 organisations** attending partner events
- **150 individuals** receiving partner updates (also published online)





### Residents voice and experience

Safer Redhill has sought to put residents, businesses and visitors to Redhill at the centre of the work.









### Delivery has responded to research + data

#### **Together we understood....**

Requests for increased visibility and enforcement from police and Council

Data re. shoplifting, drugs, county lines

More wanted for young people, for their own safety and also because of perceived impacts on other age groups

Safer spaces, particularly at night

Knowing how to report and confidence in reporting



#### So as a partnership we....

Increased enforcement on target crimes alongside increased visibility/patrols

Delivered physical improvements such as lighting and sought to build community resilience

### Police-led operational activity

#### Activity to target known Organised Crime Groups causing community harm in Redhill

- Targeted operations focused on county lines drug dealing. This included four primary waves of intelligence development and planning, supported by the Safer Neighbourhood Team and specialist teams within the Met Police, followed by executive action both locally and outside of Surrey.
- Operations in Redhill supported by specialist teams across the force. including the Serious Organised Crime Unit and Specialist Crime Command, which includes a dog unit.











### Police-led operational activity

#### Activity to target priority crime types and hotspot locations

- Targeted activity to tackle violence against women and girls, including plain clothed Behavioural Detection Officers deployed into the night-time economy to identify predatory behaviour. This tactic is also used to tackle harassment of female joggers.
- Joint operations alongside the British Transport Police (Anti-Gang & County Drug Line Teams), Sussex Police, Southern Rail, Surrey County Council Children's Services and others, at Redhill Train Station.
- Retail crime operations alongside Redhill Business Guild.
- Modern Slavery & Organised Immigration Crime operations alongside Immigration Enforcement, particularly targeting fast food delivery riders and taxis.

- Dedicated road safety deployments led by Roads Policing and the Commercial Vehicle Unit.
- Hundreds of dedicated and targeted patrols in key locations, often alongside partners such as the YMCA Youth Workers and Borough Council Joint Enforcement Team.
- Regular drugs and weapons operations at local colleges.





### Outcomes

- 150+ arrests
- 93 charged to court (81 remanded to court)
- 9 Organised Crime Groups/ County Drug Lines dismantled/ severely disrupted
- 82 drugs seizures, including 10 kilos of cocaine, potential street value of £800,000, 7 kilos cannabis, approximate value £20,000
- £115,000+ cash recovered
- 425 person searches and multiple weapons seized
- 40 premises searched
- 80 Community Resolutions
- Over 30 years of prison time handed out to date with many more significant trials and sentencing hearings yet to take place





### Work with and for young people

**Detached youth work** from YMCA 4 evenings a week around Redhill:

- Y-Bus purchased and fitted out (Safer Streets funding 2/3<sup>rd</sup>)
- YMCA delivered 169 detached youth sessions engaging 1,325 young people

**Education and mentoring** from Ment4 on gangs and drugs with a focus on making positive choices:

- 13 assemblies across 5 local schools and colleges engaging 3,555 young people
- 120 hours of mentoring for 10 vulnerable young people

**Mural** for previously darker area of Memorial Park

- 12 young people identified who would benefit put design together
- Redhill artist with a commitment to the area











# Physical improvements

#### Lighting in Memorial Park:

- 9 new solar lights lighting main pathway
- Resident support and positive feedback around feelings of safety

#### Improvements to Fairfax play area on Cromwell Estate:

- Significant engagement through community day; Cromwell Community Group and letters and social media with residents about this play area and wider park/MUGA where there was ASB
- 9 new solar lights to reduce dark spots that had caused concern
- Removed shelter that had been site of ASB and installed new benches
- Complimentary work done by Council upgrading play area, planting trees and wildflower seed
- VITAL wider work done by Raven Housing Trust on the wider estate around lighting, pavements and upgrades to support safety

Upgraded two well located **CCTV cameras** in town centre and communications reinforced presence of working CCTV across town.

# Building community resilience

Work with Redhill Boxing Club to increase youth capacity

#### Women's self-defence

- Responded to community feedback
- 5 sessions as a pilot, 17 women attending
  - Learnt practical skills
  - Built confidence
- Police and ESDAS attended to provide advice

### Training for local Street Pastors

 Police, YMCA and Reigate & Banstead Borough Council all delivered sessions

### Shared partner training

• Anti-social behaviour; substance misuse; suicide prevention





### A visible partnership

#### Communication aims:

# ASB campaign

A campaign to help people understand what ASB is and how they could make a difference by reporting it. The campaign:

- ran between October 2024 and March 2025 (with a test in summer 2024)
- used content showing local partners working in Redhill
- worked digitally across partner social media accounts, as well as paid adverting on Meta and Google Display
- used town centre poster sites and banners at the entrance to the park

Campaign results:

- Digital ads were shown to people in or interested in Redhill around 7m
- 12.5k visits to the website
- Latest survey data shows around 65% of respondents had seen the campaign and people said they were more likely to report anti-social behaviour in April 2025 than they were 18 months previously

### Crime and ASB trends

**Total notifiable crime** – 12-month comparison (April 2025)





\*The increase in bladed article offences can be attributed to greater use of police stop and search powers within the town during this project. There is no evidence to suggest that more people are carrying knives in the area.

\*\*The increase in commercial burglary primarily reflects a greater number of retail stores having offences of retail theft classified as burglary. This is where they have been previously issued a banning notice from the store.

A bespoke Redhill survey shows residents and visitors are \*\*\*:

- feeling safer in Redhill at night
- have seen improvements with anti-social behaviour and alcohol-related nuisance
- are more confident to report Anti-Social Behaviour

However, there's still more to do:

- to improve overall feelings of safety
- to improve feelings of safety for women and girls
- to address issues residents are raising e.g. parking, CCTV and specific problem areas

Partners continue to work to address these issues

Report produced in April 2025 the Wave 2 survey ran from 10th March to 30th March 2025 with 375 responses. The Wave 1 survey ran from 2nd October to 30th October 2023 with 476 respondents.









### Structured debrief and good practice

In January 2025 a structured debrief was held, which involved members of the wider Safer Redhill partnership. Several areas of good practice have been identified, all of which have been shared with the national lead for Clear, Hold, Build, including:

- National recognition for our planning process and development of the Safer Redhill partnership
- Extremely resilient and powerful delivery group
- Comprehensive communications strategy and brand development across stakeholders helps articulate what the 'Clear, Hold, Build' project is trying to achieve and brings partners together

- The partnership will continue to identify areas of concern and seek to implement remedial measures where reasonable to do so
